This Month Takes a Look at the Amazing Story of Opal Lee and Her Quest to have Juneteenth Recognized Nationally

WHAT IS JUNETEENTH?

You know best what children in this age group may need to help them understand the complex history of the United States, but guides with specific language can help! Here's our suggestion for this age group. However, be ready to modify wherever you see appropriate for different developmental levels and learning abilities.

"Juneteenth celebrates the day enslaved people in Texas learned they were free. But it took 2.5 years for this important news to travel from Washington D.C. to Texas! To understand why this happened, we need to learn about the Civil War and how it changed America. A determined woman named Opal Lee worked for many years to make Juneteenth a national holiday."

THE STORY OF FREEDOM

APRIL 12, 1861 \times **Civil War Begins** The Civil War started when Southern states wanted to keep slavery, but Northern states wanted to end it. The country was divided and fighting began.

JANUARY 1, 1863 S Emancipation Proclamation President Lincoln announced that enslaved people in rebellious states were free! But many areas, especially Texas, didn't get this news right away.

JUNE 19, 1865 Reedom News Arrives in Texas Union soldiers arrived in Texas with news that slavery had ended. This was 2.5 years after the Emancipation Proclamation! The celebration began on June 19th.

OCTOBER 7, 1926 Opal Lee is Born Opal Lee was born in Marshall, Texas. From a young age, she believed in fairness and helping others.

1990s-2010s (C) Fighting for Recognition Opal organized events and taught people about Juneteenth. She wanted everyone in America to know about this important day in history.

2016-2017 A The Great Walk At age 89, Opal walked from Texas to Washington D.C.! She walked to show how important Juneteenth was to the whole country.



JUNE 17, 2021 A Victory at Last! President Biden signed a law making Juneteenth a federal holiday! Opal was invited to the White House to watch this historic moment.

ENSLAVED - Forced to work without pay or freedom

UNION SOLDIERS - Northern army soldiers who fought to end slavery
